Vaughn Jacobs Attempted to Hide in Bushes

Milliken Says Tax Hike Possible, Depending on What the Voters Do

LANSING (UP1) — Gov. William G. Milliken will not rule out a possible 1975 tax increase to keep the state out of the red if voters repeal the sales tax on food and drugs and approve a \$205 million bonus for Vietnam-era veterans.

Milliken told a news conference Thursday that if the food tax is repealed, "it is inevitable there will have to be new sources of revenue next year."

Approval of the veterans bonus would create even a greater demand for new revenues, he said.

But the governor said he was "not prepared at all" to say flatly that a tax increase would be the only feasible remedy.

"I will be prepared to make some very definitive

statements on that whole question shortly," he said

Milliken once again declined to take a stand on the sales tax repeal but said, "I'll have a position long before the campaign runs its course."

He endorsed the veterans bonus proposal months ago.

Estimates of lost revenues that would result from the repeal of the food and drug tax have varied from \$150 million to \$220 million. Immediate cost of the veterans bond issue would depend on how the bonds are floated.


Milliken said the \$1.1 billion transportation bond issue on the ballot largely as the result of his strong support would not have the same kind of fiscal

impact as the other two proposals.

"The transportation bond issue will not be effectuated for a period of time," he said, "and then it will be phased in to the general budget."

A \$15.2 million interim pay increase for state employes expected to be approved by the legislature before it recesses for the election also can be absorbed, Milliken said. He indicated that job reduction through attrition could make up the sum.

The House Taxation Committee already is looking into the possibility of a 1975 tax increase largely on the assumption that the sales tax repealer will win voter approval.


