After noting that the boycott in this nation has been "heartening," he added: "Now we must take the boycott message overseas. We must reach free trade unionists in other lands and solicit their support for the United Farm Workers."

The UFWA has been engaged in a jurisdictional battle with the Teamsters Union in California over the right to organize farm

workers. After an apparent settlement of the dispute in 1971, the situation flared up again this nast spring when the Teamsters signed contracts with growers who had previously signed contracts with the UFWA.

Both unions claim support of the farm workers.

secretariats," Meany said, "will take action to secure overseas trade union cooperation" with the boycott.

Chavez said that he was announcing the beginning of the international boycott with a week of press conferences, parades demonstrations religious services, fund-raising events, and picketing across the nation.

Efforts will concentrate on Canada, the United Kingdom, Scandanavia and West Germany during the international boycott, Chavez noted, because these areas buy large quantities of California table grapes and head lettuce.

Lawbreakers Should Compensate Victims, Chaplains' Official Says

Tex. (NC)-Criminals should be made to provide compensation to their victims and families, two officials of a national Catholic chaplain's organization proposed and Oblate Father John J.

Bishop Andrew G. Grutka of Gary, Ind., the episcopal adviser to the American Catholic Correctional Association (ACCCA), Foley, ACCCA president, made the recommendation during the meeting of the ACCCA.

"Victims of heinous crimes are often totally forgotten," Bishop Grutka said, "and their families are left in poverty and with no means of financial support."


Fr. Foley, a former prison chaplain himself, proposed that in some cases the offenders should be made to help with the financial obligations of the victims' families.

On the ladder of social priorities that society constructs, he explained, the prison aposto-late is at the bottom.

"There are no easy solutions when you deal with human behavior," he said. "You have to understand the causes of criminal behavior, and in so many cases it dates back to the roots childhood-discrimination. poverty, inadequate education, lack of job opportunities.'

One of the greatest needs in the prison apostolate, both men agreed, is more chaplains.

To alleviate the problem, Bishop Grutka said, "We will eventually have to rely on permanent deacons, Sisters, Religious, lay volunteers and priests from the parishes in the vicinities of the correctional institu-



Rev. Mr. Amar attended St. Joseph's Seminary High School in Grand Rapids and then took up residence at the Maronite Rite House of Studies in Washington, DC. He received B.A. degrees in philosophy and English from the Catholic University of America. He did graduate studies at Catholic University's School of Sacred Theology and received S.T.B. and S.T.L. degrees in historical theology. While completing his graduate work in theology, Rev. Mr. Amar joined Catholic University's Institute of Christian Ori-ental Research where he received an M.A. in Semitic and Biblical languages. He has done extensive work in the history and literature of the origins of the Church in the Middle East.

The Maronite Church is a branch of the Catholic Church as it developed in Northern Syria and Lebanon. Its liturgical language is Aramaic, the language spoken by Christ and his apostles. In the United States the Maronite Rite numbers over sixty parishes, with diocesan headquarters at Detroit.

The Bishop's Message...

Dear Members of the Diocese,

I have mentioned on numerous occasions that the members of the Michigan Catholic Conference, composed of bishops, laity, a priest and a Sister have established and assisted a statewide investigation into what is entitled "Respect Life Task Force and Planning". Under the leadership of Fr. Charles Dautremont and in cooperation with hundreds in this diocese, the committee representing the Michigan Catholic Conference expressed what were our principal concerns and targets for the protection of life. I have written previously of "powerlessness" and what it means to the poor, the handicapped, the elderly and so many others. Here today I indicate another area which

comes under the general heading of "Respect for Life":

PROTECTION OF LIFE

Unfortunately when we speak protection of life it is generally interpreted as a program against abortion. This is only one phase of the broad picture, and in no way is this remark to be taken as a downgrading of the high priority we place on the prevention of the direct killing of the unborn. In no uncertain terms I wish to reassert my position, ultimate authority on faith and morals in this diocese, that abortion is in direct conflict with the teachings of God in the Ten Commandments: "Thou shalt not kill."

ANTI-REBEL ARCHBISHOP IN MOZAMBIQUE RESIGNS

VATICAN CITY (NC)-The Vatican has announced, without giving any reasons, the resigna-tion of Archbishop Custodio Alvim Pereira of Lourenco Mar-ques in the Portuguese African territory of Mozambique.

This was widely interpreted as a removal. Such speculation was based partly on the Vati-can's usual custom of giving reasons for a prelate's resignation (the announcement of Archbishop Alvim Percira's resignation said simply that Pope Paul VI had accepted it). It was also based on widespread criticism of the archbishop as a supporter of Portugal's nowceased repression of African rebels in Mozambique.



Jesuit Priest Dismissed from Order

NEW YORK (NC) — Jesuit ther Joseph O'Rourke has superiors forbidding him to en sent a letter of dismissal min his order, the New York white of the Society of Jesus province of the Society of Jesus white American String that Father Joseph O'Rourke has been sent a letter of dismissal from his order, the New York province of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) announced here Sept.

Fr. O'Rourke, a member of the board of directors of Catholics for a Free Choice, an organization advocating freedom of choice on abortion, recently baptized a child in Marlboro,

issued a statement saying that the reasons for the dismissal were broader than Fr. O'Rourke's disobedience in the Marlboro Baptism controversy.

"The judgment ... has to do with differences of understanding and judgment between Fr.

O'Rourke and his Religious superiors with regard to the nature of a Jesuit's commitment to the society, and the society's service to the Church," Fr. Taylor said.

Fr O'Rourke had baptized Nathaniel Morreale Aug. 20 after the pastor in the Marlboro parish had deferred the Baptism because the child's mother, Mrs. Carol Morreale, publicly sup-ported abortion advocate William Baird.

The pastor was backed by Boston archdiocesan authorities. When it was announced that Fr. O'Rourke had agreed to baptize the child, his Jesuit superiors met with him and ordered him not to interfere in the pastoral decision of the pastor and the archdiocese.

Dismissal from the Jesuit order does not in itself involve a dismissal from the priesthood, and the expulsion from the order can be appealed.

At a press conference following the dismissal announcement,

Fr. O'Rourke called the process of dismissal a "kangaroo court." He said he had not been told

beforehand that he would be violating his oath of obedience if he baptized the baby, and he "never suspected" that he would be dismissed because of his actions.

Fr. O'Rourke said he plans to appeal his dismissal to the Jesuit headquarters in Rome and the Vatican's Congregation for Religious. If those appeals fail, he said, he will seek to be incardi-nated (accepted for priestly work) in a diocese.

Mrs. Ford Reaffirms **Abortion Stand** at Catholic Gala

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (NC) — Betty Ford, wife of President Gerald Ford, explained her proabortion stand at an impromptu press conference while attending a fund-raising event for a Catholic hospital here.

St. Vincent's Hospital hon-ored Mrs. Ford and others as 'legendary women of America" during the fund-raising Gala II, the highlights of which were a \$500 per couple dinner at the Museum of Arts and a \$150 per couple awards banquet at the civic center.

"I am glad to see abortion brought out of the backwoods and put in the hospitals where I think that type of operation should be performed," she said, 'and I think there are cases where abortion is necessary for the health of the individual."

Mrs. Ford added that she favors changes in the welfare system that would not encour-age women to have more chil-dren in order to receive more

money.
"It is hard when I see the woman on welfare in Washington with eight or nine children, the first lady pointed out, "and she can't support them and the only way she can get more welfare is to have more chil-

She also stated her belief that some women are not "equipped

Sr. Xavier Ballance, adminis-trator of the hospital, told NC News that she had been uncertain as to whether Mrs. Ford is actually pro-abortion because she had read different newspapers quoting Mrs. Ford as saying different things on the subject.

Several women who were suggested for the honor, Sister noted, had been dropped from consideration after the Gala II committee discovered that they held pro-abortion views.

The other women honored as "legendary women of America" were Patricia Buckley, wife of columnist William Buckley; television personality Kitty Carlisle; vision personality Kitty Carlisie; actress Cicely Tyson; Rep. Warnecke; fashion coordinator Eleanor Lambert; and singer-actress Jane Pickens Langley.
